Future Opportunities for XPCS of Atomic-Scale Dynamics at Interfaces

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The greatly increased coherent X-ray flux available from MBA storage rings will enable Xray photon correlation spectroscopy (XPCS) studies of a much wider variety of systems and phenomena than currently possible. These include more weakly scattering systems, such as surfaces and 2-d materials, and observations of short-length-scale dynamics at higher wavenumber and at the associated higher speeds. In addition, the increased coherent flux at higher X-ray energies will allow better optimization of the trade-off between higher signal level and undesired interaction of the X-ray beam with the sample dynamics. In this talk I will discuss some of the scientific opportunities for studies of atomic-scale dynamics at interfaces. These will be illustrated by examples of recent state-of-the-art experiments (e.g. [1]) as well as simulations of surface phenomena and XPCS.
